REQUIESCAT IN PACE

Born in Philadelphia on June 20, 1947, he was the son of the John B. and Rita Shepherd Wendrychowicz. He attended Visitation B.V.M. School, St. George School, and Northeast Catholic High School, which he left during his sophomore year, to enter St. Charles Borromeo Seminary. He was ordained May 10, 1973, at the Cathedral of SS. Peter and Paul by Cardinal John Krol.

His assignments were as parochial vicar – and later pastor – at St. Ladislaus, St. Josaphat and St. John Cantius Parishes, all in Philadelphia, and St. Katharine Drexel Parish in Chester. He also served on the faculty of Archbishop Kennedy High School and St. Hubert High School and as chaplain of Little Flower High School and Cardinal Dougherty High School. From 2006 until his death, he served as pastor of St. Agnes Parish, Sellersville.

Since 1992 Msgr. Wendrychowicz served as archdiocesan director and chaplain for the Catholic Committee on Scouting and also as Region 3 (Pennsylvania and New Jersey) Chaplain, National Catholic Committee on Scouting.

"Msgr. John" was named Chaplain to His Holiness Pope John Paul II on March 24, 2003.

He loved travel, visiting Indian reservations and was a history buff who served as a costumed re-enactor in a Philadelphia celebration of the signing of the Declaration of Independence. He was a fan of "Star Wars," "The Chronicles of Narnia" and the Harry Potter series of movies. He especially enjoyed the

Christmas liturgy for children, his sister said, where he might weave in lessons from the "Polar Express" into his homily.

Msgr. Wendrychowicz died on December 20, 2012.

"I admired his dedication to youth ministry and to the scouts," said Msgr. Francis X. Schmidt, a former youth director for the Archdiocese. "He was a good, gentle man."

The Father of Catholic Scouting

It is necessary to begin this publication with some information on Venerable Jacques Sevin who is considered by some to be the father of Catholic Scouting. Sevin was a French Jesuit priest who was an early supporter of Scouting. He spent time in England learning about the Scouting movement and while there he met Lord Baden Powell.

Sevin would later publish a Scouting handbook in 1919 called "Le Scoutisme" where he provided an outline for a Catholic form of Scouting. Then in 1920, he established Scouts de France using the model he detailed in "Le Scoutisme". Through his actions, other Catholics saw how Scouting could serve as an effective youth ministry program.

Our local Catholic Committee on Scouting

To begin one must remember that there were not always religious committees on Scouting. Thus, one must trace the origins of the Catholic Committee on Scouting (CCS) back to 1914 when the BSA created a Catholic Bureau. According to the National Catholic Committee on Scouting (NCCS), it was not until 1922 that the first CCS was established in New York but respectfully, they are incorrect.² In the *1920 Annual of Delaware and Montgomery Counties Council*, there is a Catholic Committee listed with F. E. Peyton, Walter Hallahan, and W. L. Hirst as members of the committee.³ These annual reports (essentially council yearbooks) covered the prior year, thus the *1920 Annual* covers what happened in the council during 1919. I will not assert that this is the oldest CCS in the country, but it is older than the New York CCS mentioned by the NCCS. It is likely this was unknown to the NCCS, and I do not mean to be disrespectful with this correction. It is unclear when exactly the Philadelphia Catholic Committee on Scouting officially began, however it is known that Philadelphia Council had a Catholic Troop as early as 1919.⁴

Prior to the 1996 merger of the Philadelphia Council with the Valley Forge Council (formerly the Delaware and Montgomery County Council), an organized CCS existed at least as early as November 5, 1950. On that date a group of

Catholic scouters met and created the Valley Forge Council CCS. Its initial officers included the Rev. Vincent D. McGartland, VFC Chaplain, the Rev. Thomas Kirk, Assistant Chaplain and Spiritual Director, and Mr. Robert Hovell, lay Chairman. This nascent group represented parishes predominantly located in eastern Delaware County. ⁵

Promoting Catholic Scouting

In the early years of Scouting, Catholics made up a disproportionate percentage of Scouts when compared to the Catholic share of all religiously affiliated individuals. In 1917, Catholics sponsored just 3% of all troops in the country and this grew to 10% in 1921 but at the time Catholics made up 25% to 28% of the general religious population. This disparity left plenty of work for all of the CCSs in the country to do and the Catholic Committee on Scouting, Archdiocese of Philadelphia certainly kept busy.

When it comes to our local camps, accommodations were sometimes made in order to better serve Catholic Scouts. For example, at Delmont it was decided in 1925 to have fish for everyone each Friday to make menu planning easier while also accommodating Catholics. This consideration became unnecessary when it was decided in the 1960s during the Second Vatican Council that another act of penance could substitute abstaining from meat. There was also mention of a separate camp for Roman Catholic Scouts in 1928 but that is all we know about this separate camp. It appears that there was no need for adjustments at Hart or Resica Falls since there is no known record of such. It is unknown if adjustments were made for Catholics at Horseshoe or Ockanickon.

While not exclusively just for Catholic Scouts, religious spaces were always made available at our local camps. Since 1918 Wilbur Rock has acted as the chapel for Delmont, and in 1964 the Christian Chapel was built at Hart. The chapel at Resica was likely built along with the rest of the camp in the 1950s. Originally it was built for all Christians, but it is today used for all faiths.

Similarly, Ockanickon's chapel has always been used for all faiths.¹⁰ The Schlannstine Memorial Chapel at Horseshoe was constructed by the local Order of the Arrow Lodge in 1930 and then expanded in 1960.¹¹ It was also dedicated to Sgt Frederick Schlaanstine in 1960. No mention was found of a separate place of worship for Catholics at Horseshoe. Thus, it seems that in our area it was more common for Catholics to share places of worship with others at our camps.

However, at Treasure Island Catholics had their own space for worship in the form of Kiwanis Lodge. Kiwanis Lodge was built in 1922 and primarily served as the handicraft area for the camp but it also houses a fully equipped Catholic altar in the back. Mass was held each Saturday by a priest who visited the island solely for the sake of celebrating the Mass. This altar and the items needed for Mass are still present on the island to this day.¹²

Catholic Scout Retreats have been held since 1946.¹³ At times these retreats were held by the councils themselves but in more recent years they have been hosted by the Archdiocese of Philadelphia CCS due to declining membership and event attendance. Catholic Scouts have also attended Scout Sundays both in their respective parishes and at the Cathedral Basilica of SS Peter and Paul since the event was first introduced in the mid-1940s.¹⁴

As a key component of its mission and ministry, the Archdiocese of Philadelphia CCS also promotes the national Catholic religious emblems program and in our Archdiocese, the emblems are traditionally awarded at the Archdiocesan Scout Mass each year. The national awards along with some others are as follows:

Light of Christ: Approved in 1992 and awarded to 6-7 years old, Wolf and Bear Cub Scouts.¹⁵

Parvuli Dei: Started in 1953 and approved in 1956. Awarded to 8-10 years old, Webelos and AOL Cub Scouts.

Ad Altare Dei: Started in 1926 and approved in 1939.17 Awarded to any Roman

Catholic youth who has completed the sixth grade and is active in Scouts BSA, Venturing or Sea Scouting. This award focuses on teaching the seven Sacraments.¹⁸

Pope Pius XII: Approved in 1960 and awarded to high school and college aged youth in Venturing Crews, Ships, or Scout Troops.¹⁹ This award focuses on vocation and developing into Catholic adulthood.

Light is Life: Approved in 1980 and awarded to Scouts, BSA members between twelve to thirteen years old who are a part of Eastern Catholic Churches.²⁰ These Scouts work on Light is Life rather than the Ad Altare Dei emblem.


The Robert G. Gabage Memorial Archdiocese of Philadelphia Catholic Scout Award: Unique to the Archdiocese of Philadelphia CCS, this award is presented to Scouts who earn all four of the national religious emblems available to them. The award, a specially authorized "square knot" for display on the Scout uniform, is named in memory of Robert G. Gabage, a former chair of the Archdiocesan Catholic Committee on Scouting, devoted father, distinguished scouter, Scoutmaster of Troop 201, and Skipper of Ship 201, Jenkintown, PA.²¹

The Archdiocesan CCS sponsors the **Saint John Neumann Emblem** (SJN), which may be awarded to adults who have provided exemplary service in the Catholic scouting ministry. The SJN serves as a preliminary recognition that may lead to award of the national **Saint George Emblem** after further years of meritorious service.

Catholic chartered units are eligible to earn the Archdiocesan CCS **Cardinal Krol Unit Award** by satisfying stringent program criteria. The Cardinal Krol award is complementary to, but distinct from, the national **St. Pope Paul VI Unit Award**.

Scouting for Faith

The Archdiocese of Philadelphia CCS is yet again unique with its five-part patch set called "Scouting for Faith." This patch set is designed to push Catholic Scouts to examine various aspects of their faith. The patches center around pilgrimage, knowledge, discernment, and evangelization in order to promote spiritual growth. Each patch is earned separately and has its own specific requirements. Adults can also earn this series if they help to facilitate youth in earning it. A final black crosspatch is awarded to those who earn the other four patches. Adults may also earn this award, but they have a different set of requirements from the youth.



Over the next several pages you will see some patches from the retreats and Scout Sundays. I feel the need to include this section since I collect Scouting memorabilia solely to make it accessible to as many Scouts and Scouters as possible. A special thank you to Steve Perrone for helping me start this collection and to Jack McLaughlin for sending me photos of patches from his collection.

























